

[REDACTED] [REDACTED], St. Louis, said the object appeared to be about the size of a light private airplane, but bore no resemblance to a plane and was much faster. 'It was flat, reddish brown in color and I saw a glint in the late sunlight at that height, although the sun had set where we were,' he said. 'The object seemed to have an oscillating motion and was somewhat triangular.'"

NARRATIVE SUMMARY:

Mr. [REDACTED] stated in substance as follows: On the evening of 7 May 1949 at approximately 1800 hours CST he was sitting on the back lawn with his wife and they were watching the gulls from the Mississippi River when they noticed a strange object almost directly overhead. Mr. [REDACTED] stated at first he thought it was a large bird, but closer observation disclosed that it was at a much higher altitude than the gulls, that it was somewhat triangular in shape, and that it was traveling at a terrific rate of speed. Mr. [REDACTED] further stated that he has been a passenger on commercial air liners and would estimate the altitude of the object at approximately nine (9) or ten (10) thousand feet. Mr. [REDACTED] would not estimate the speed, but stated it was only in sight for approximately forty-five (45) seconds and was faster than any airplane he has ever seen in the sky. Mr. [REDACTED] described the object as being about the size of a light private plane and that it closely resembled the shape of a Sting Ray with the exception that the object had no ship-like tail. Mr. [REDACTED] further described the object as having a dark, dull reddish brown color, and that he observed a glint or reflection along the right side of the object as it was oscillating. Mr. [REDACTED] would observe this glint or reflection when the right side was higher than the left. Mr. [REDACTED] further stated that he first observed the object at about eleven (11) o'clock, that it was at an angle of approximately eighty-five (85) degrees above the horizon, and that it was traveling in a south west direction. Mr. [REDACTED] further stated that the object traveled in a straight path without apparently gaining or losing altitude, that it was oscillating from side to side, and that it disappeared in the atmosphere.

On 31 May 1949, Mrs. [REDACTED] St. Louis, Mo., was interviewed regarding the sighting of a strange object in the sky on 7 May 1949. Mrs. [REDACTED] substantiated Mr. [REDACTED] version of the sighting of the object with the exception that she thought it was buff colored and thought there was reddish glow, somewhat like the glow of an iron coal stove, along the right edge of the object as it was oscillating through the sky. Both agreed that the sun had just gone down behind the trees, and that there was still quite a bit of light in the sky. Neither observed any fins, canopies, or antennas on the object.

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AT ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI

1. On 31 May 1949, Mr. [REDACTED], St. Louis, Missouri, was interviewed regarding his sighting an unidentified object in the sky on 7 May 1949. Mr. [REDACTED] stated in substance as follows: On the evening of 7 May 1949 at approximately 1800 hours CST he was sitting on the back lawn with his wife and they were watching the gulls from the Mississippi River when they noticed a strange object almost directly overhead. Mr. [REDACTED] stated at first he thought it was a large bird, but closer observation disclosed that it was at a much higher altitude than the gulls, that it was somewhat triangular in shape, and that it was traveling at a terrific rate of speed. Mr. [REDACTED] further stated that he has been a passenger on commercial air liners and would estimate the altitude of the object at approximately nine (9) or ten (10) thousand feet. Both agreed that the sun had just gone down behind the trees and that there was still quite a bit of light in the sky. Neither observed any fins, canopies, or antennas on the object.

3. Interview of neighbors in the vicinity of [REDACTED], St. Louis, Missouri, on 6 June 1949, failed to reveal any information that would indicate either Mr. or Mrs. [REDACTED] may be eccentric or that they had ever reported seeing any strange objects before. The object was not noticed by any of the neighbors however they all stated they could not remember looking in the sky at that time on 7 May 1949.

4. A check of the files of the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department, St. Louis, Missouri, on 3 June 1949, failed to reveal the name of either Mr. or Mrs. [REDACTED]

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as ever being arrested or ever being a complainant in any case.

5. A check of the files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, St. Louis, Missouri, on 3 June 1949, failed to reveal any record of Mrs. or Mrs. [REDACTED].

6. On 3 June 1949 the flight records of the McDonnell Aircraft Corporation, Lambert Field, St. Louis, Missouri, revealed there were no flights of aircraft from that plant after 0930 hours on 7 May 1949.

7. On 3 June 1949, [REDACTED], Lieutenant Junior Grade, United States Navy, Operations Officer, U. S. Naval Air Station, Lambert Field, St. Louis, Missouri, advised there had been no flights from the Naval Air Station between 1730 hours and 1830 hours Central Standard Time on 7 May 1949. Lt. [REDACTED] further stated that the Ground Control Approach Unit had secured at 1615 hours, CST, on 7 May 1949, and had not resumed operation until 0800 hours, CST, on 9 May 1949.

NOTE: The GCA Unit at Lambert Field, St. Louis, Missouri, operated by the U.S. Navy is the only radar unit operating in this area.

8. On 3 June 1949, Mr. [REDACTED], Senior Tower Controller, Lambert Field, St. Louis, Missouri, advised the only south bound flight from Lambert Field at approximately 1800 hours CST on 7 May 1949, was a Chicago and Southern DC-4 which departed Lambert Field for Memphis, Tennessee, at 1751 hours CST. Mr. [REDACTED] further stated this ship had taken off to the northeast and would have flown over south St. Louis at an approximate altitude of six (6) or eight (8) thousand feet at the time a strange object was sighted by Mr. [REDACTED].

AT SCOTT AFB, ILLINOIS

9. On 3 June 1949 the records of the AACS, Scott Air Force Base, Illinois, were examined. Above records failed to reveal any aircraft that had arrived or departed this station between the hours of 1730 and 1830 hours, CST, on 7 May 1949.

AT ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI

10. On 6 June 1949, Mr. [REDACTED], St. Louis, Missouri, was re-interviewed to ascertain if he had noticed a commercial airliner fly over his home on the evening of 7 May 1949. [REDACTED] stated that he has noticed a four engine airliner that flies over his house late in the afternoon but that he does not remember seeing this particular airplane on the evening of 7 May 1949.

NOTE: As there were no known experimental aircraft flying in this area on 7 May 1949, it is possible Mr. [REDACTED] sighted the Chicago and Southern Airliner and in the evening twilight may have mistaken it for an unidentified object.


