Dear Sir:

At approximately 2 A.M., Monday Feb 3 I sighted what I first thought was a Cub plane. On second observation I realized it was too small to be a Cub plane & too large to be a toy. I asked one of the men with me what he thought it was & he said it must be a glider as it didn't have a propeller & we could hear no motor or hear any noise for power. We were about 7000 hundred feet from it.

We were travelling west & was about 4 miles East of Hartense Co. This (plane)? when I saw it was about 300ft. high coming in from the South to cross the road, as it crossed the road <sup>(high)</sup> it was dropping till it was about 50' to 75' over the trees. We watched it. Thinking it might crash, but it levelled off and hedge-hopped over the trees till we lost
