DISTRIBUTION BY ORIGINATOR			
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A. Description of the object: (Refer to Figure 1)

- (1) Ground observer: White streak or trail composed of discernible particles.
Pilot: Falling blue light with sparks trailing.
- (2) Ground observer: Originated as blue point; length of trail at arms length approximately two feet. Breadth of trail at horizon (disappearance) dime held at arms length.
Pilot: Size of pea at arms length.
- (3) Ground observer: Blue origin - growing white.
Pilot: Bright blue.
- (4) One

- (6) Particles of trail definitely visible to naked eye.
- (7) Trail was largest at point of disappearance
- (8) None
- (9) Ground observer: Originated as blue point; instantly turned white with broadening trail. Entire trail visible approximately one-half second and disappeared instantly. Entire trail disappeared at same instant. Entire trail composed of small particles.
Pilot: Appeared to be large falling flare.

B. Description of course of object:

- (1) A bright flash
- (2) Ground observer: 45 degree elevation, 220 degrees azimuth
Pilot: Falling toward earth West of Eglin Auxiliary Base #3 (3029N - 8631W).
- (3) Zero degrees elevation, 230 degrees azimuth.
- (4) Object was traveling away from ground observer at extremely high speed. Originating approximately 45 degree elevation to observer's left and disappearing on horizon (behind 40 ft. trees) in front and to left of observer. Pilot observed object falling at high speed.
- (5) Entire trail disappeared instantaneously.
- (6) Approximately one-half second.

J. Location of any air traffic in the area at time of sighting:

K. Comments of the preparing officer:

[REDACTED] was not available for interview by preparing officer. His description, when at variance with ground observer, was taken verbatim from his written report. Mr. [REDACTED] ground observer, is about 50 years old and has been employed at the Climatic Hangar, Eglin AFB, for approximately 10 years. He has had unusual opportunities to observe testing of USAF armament at the Air Proving Ground Center and is considered a reliable observer. He states that the subject sighting is unique in his experience. He described a solid path of glowing particles rather than a trail of sparks. The entire path persisted for approximately one-half second and disappeared simultaneously. He ruled out any natural phenomenon familiar to him. It cannot presently be determined if or where the object came to earth.

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K. Comments of the preparing officer: (Cont'd)

The technical facilities contacted at Eglin AFB had no corroborative information. No firm conclusion can be drawn by the preparing officer. Report is submitted for possible correlation with other known data.

at the same instant over the entire path.

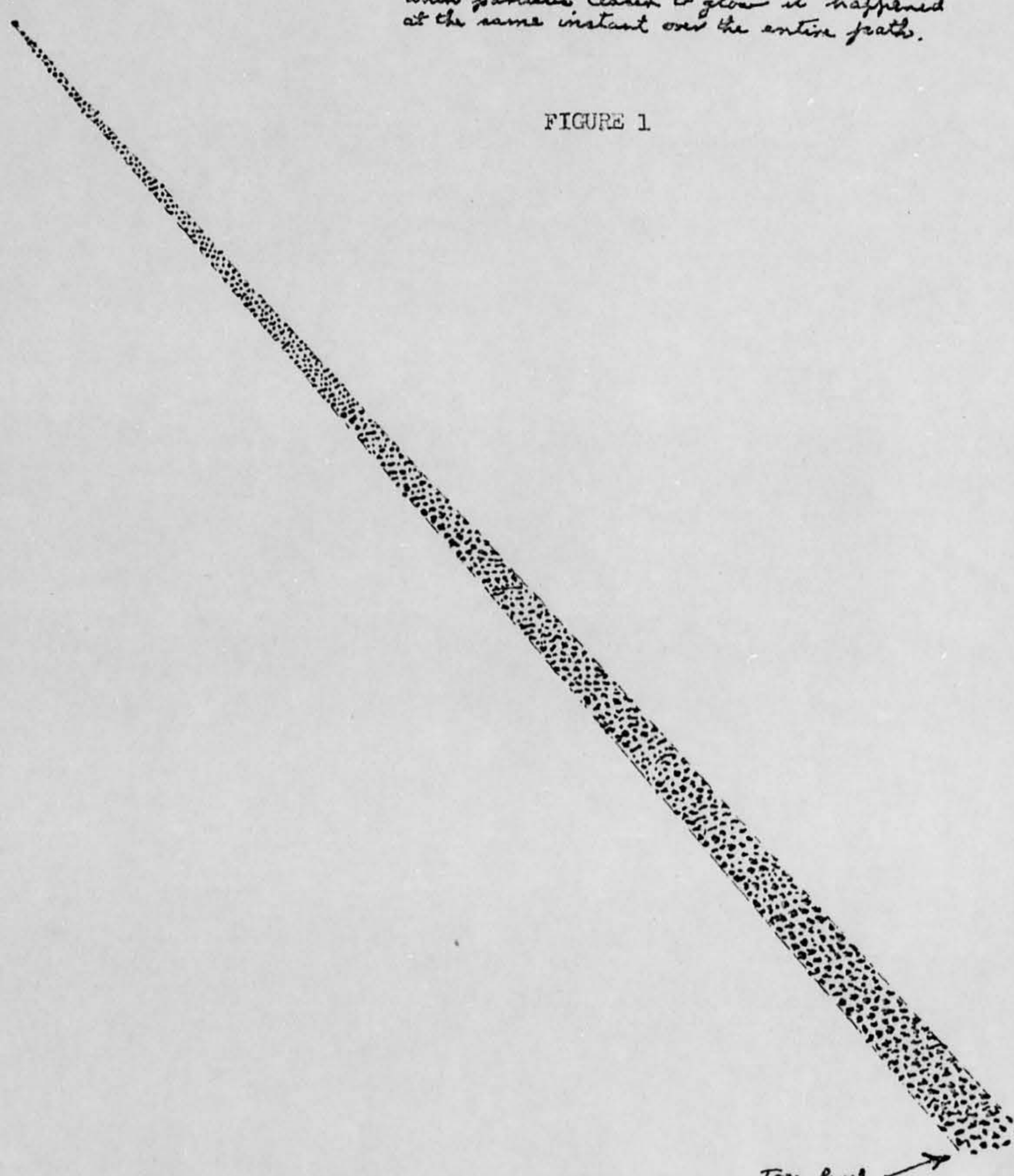
STARTING
