COMMENTS: Consultation with Dr Hynek lead to conclusion that there was sufficient evidence to evaluate the case as the setting of Jupiter and an a/c observation. The 60 deg elevation and reflection in the lake are inconsistent. The object necessarily having to be at a low angle of elevation in order to reflect from the lake. The color and magnitude 5-7X as bright as the brightest star are consistent with this analysis. Jupiter setting coincides with the disappearance of the first object. 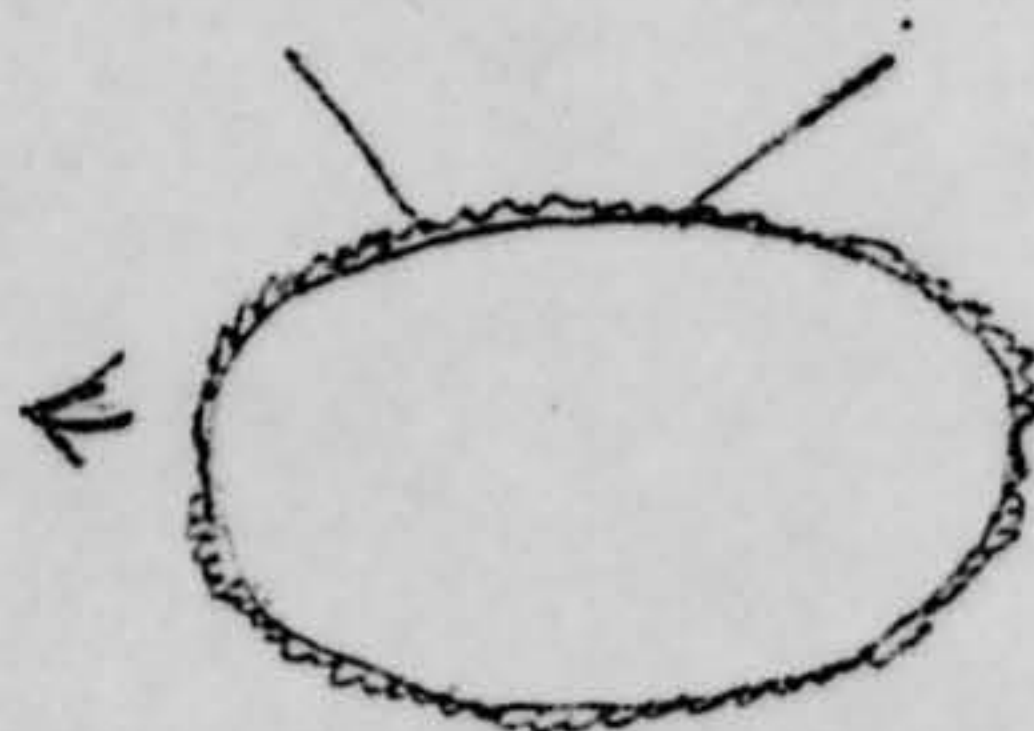

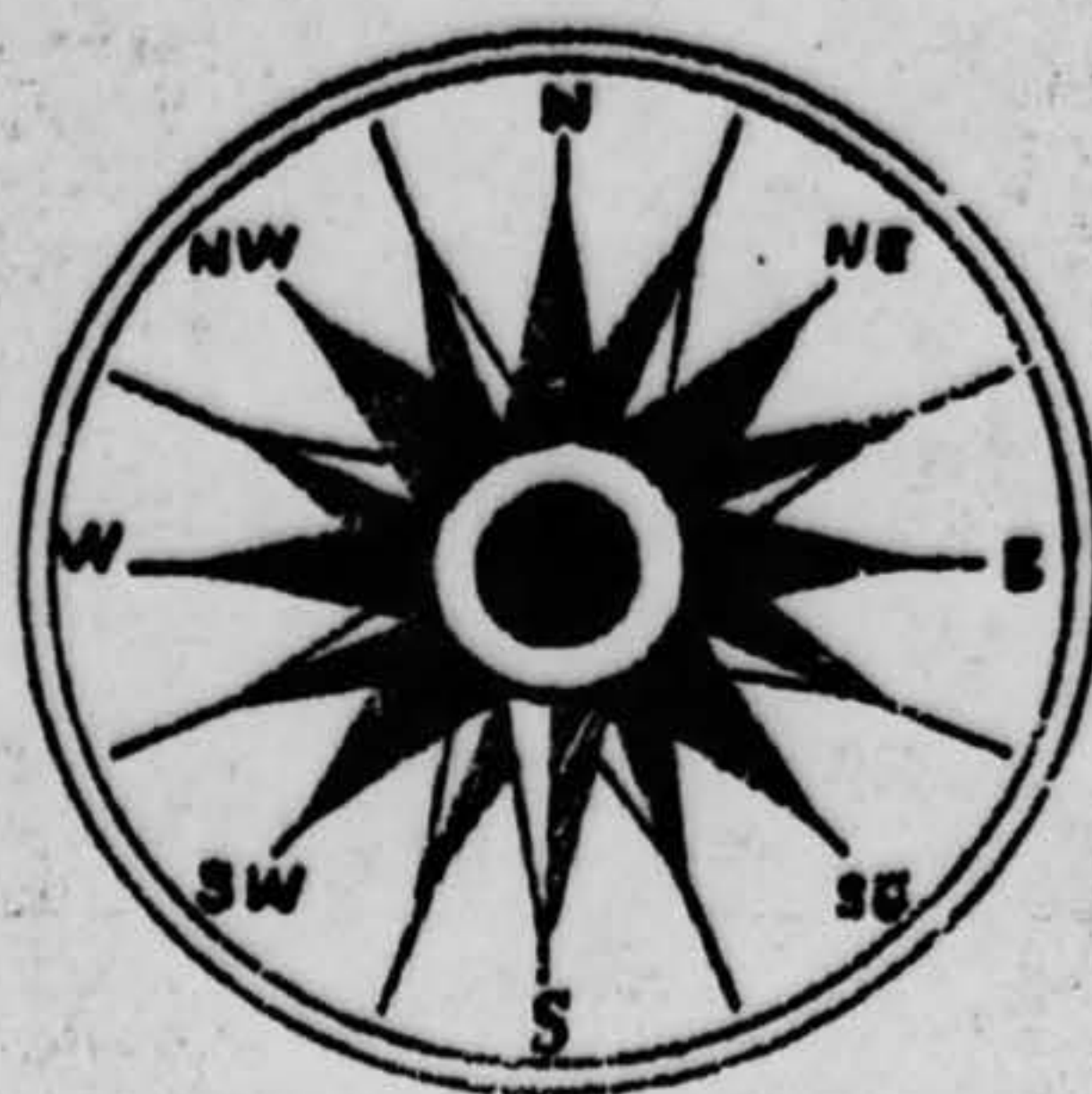
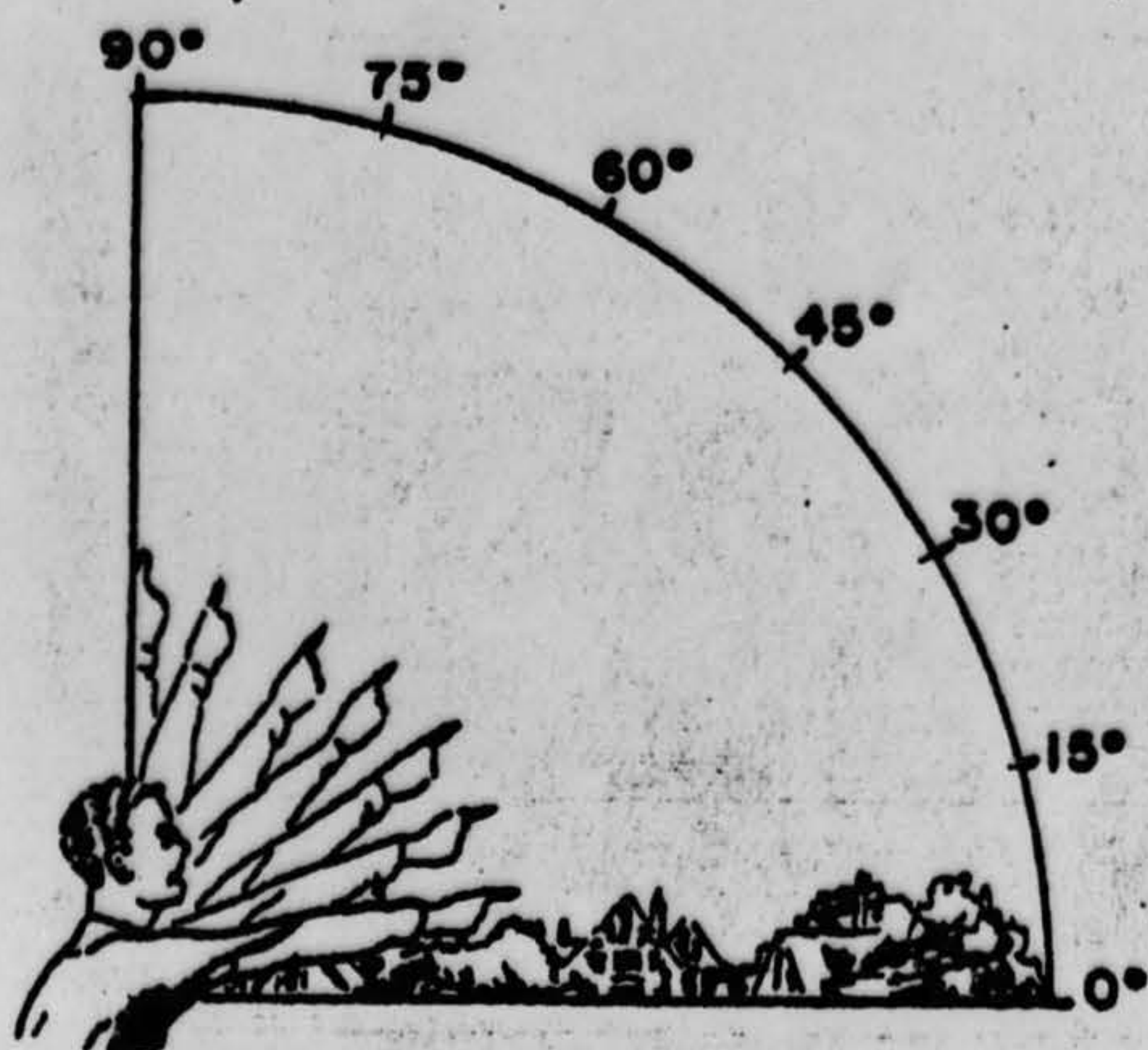

Dear Mrs. [REDACTED]

After reading of your reported UFO observation tuesday night, March 30, I am convinced that I also seen this object at approximately 10;00 PM. A passing glance from the window immediately caught my eye to an extremely bright light. This was somewhat low in the sky, west of my home which is located south of Dayton near Moraine City. First thought also was of an aircraft with landing lights, but it did not move. After a short time I got binoculars and could see positively that it did not move and also was much more brilliant than any star. The light was somewhat oval shaped and distorted as by heat or atmospheric conditions and I could not gain any idea of the distance. As I was watching, the light went out just as if it was turned off by a switch. I watched briefly, and could not detect any beacon light similar to an aircraft.

I mentioned, passively, at the time to my wife that I thought I had seen an UFO, but gave it no more thought until I read the newspaper story of you and your friends experience. You may forward this letter to any investigative authority if you care to, and I will absolutely verify the information as I have described it. If you gain any information as to the explanation of this experience I would appreciate hearing of it.

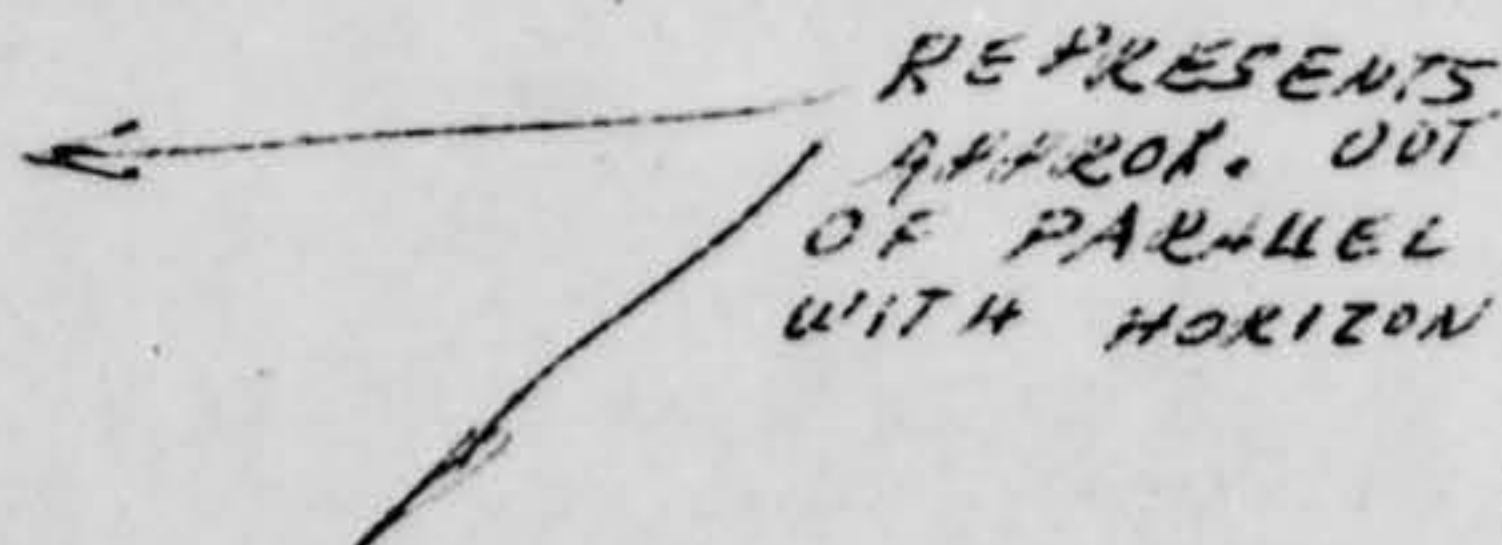

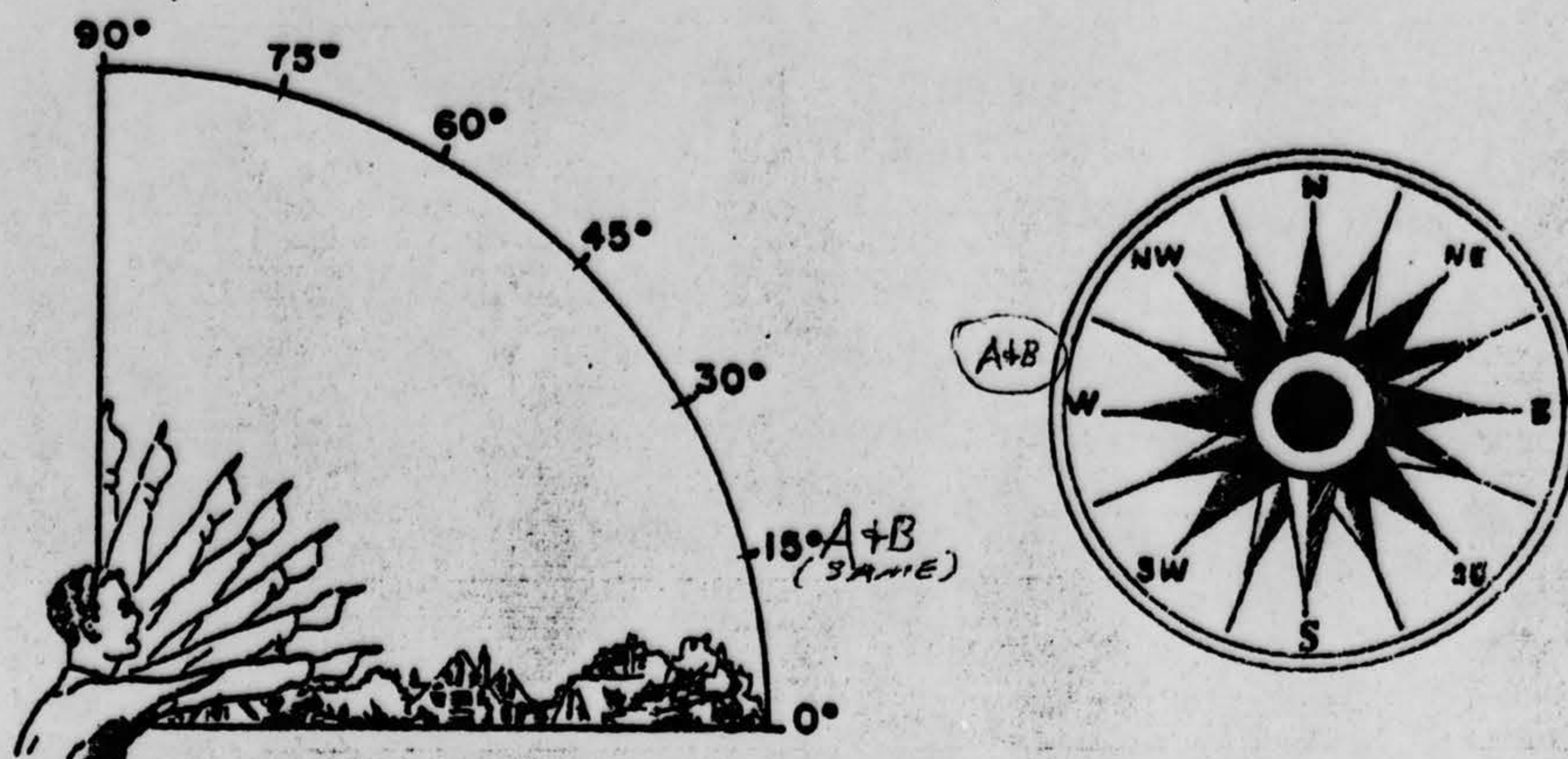

IN BRIEF:

PASSING WINDOW IN DARKENED ROOM, BRIGHT LIGHT WAS NOTICED AND NOT READILY IDENTIFIED. OBSERVATION FOR SEVERAL SECONDS REVEALED NO MOTION. SUFFICIENT TIME LAPSED TO OBTAIN BINOCULARS, AND WATCH OBJECT FOR SEVERAL SECONDS MORE. 7X MAGNIFICATION REVEALED ABSOLUTELY NO MOTION. BRIEF MENTION TO MY WIFE OF POSSIBLE UFO OBSERVATION, AND NO MORE THOUGHT OF IT UNTIL STORY IN NEWSPAPER OF PARALLEL EXPERIENCE.

At 1558, 31 Mar 65, Mrs [REDACTED] called from Rt 1, Box 240, Lewisburg, Ohio, phone [REDACTED]. On the night of 30 Mar 65 at 2200 hours and looked out the window, looking West, she saw a gold object in the sky which was six or seven times brighter than the brightest star in the sky. It was pretty large and had no antenna, reflection of object showed on the water, appeared to have its own light, so brilliant watched it for about five minutes, suddenly flickered, moved South, as it moved it faded, at this time it appeared to be going backwards, all of a sudden it was completely gone out of sight. She then looked out the South window, coming from the West was a plane. The beacon was larger than the light she observed. She watched the light go East to Dayton, kept moving East, looked through the South window for a couple of minutes. Stars were visible, no moon. The object appeared to be over Johnsville and New Lebanon, at least that was the general direction. Looked gold and flickered. Antenna as tall as it was round. Two streams of gold going up, looked like television antenna, V shaped, like rabbit ears, they were watching other stars and it always stayed in the same position and then as it moved you could see the antenna.

At 1550, 1 Apr, Mrs [REDACTED], Ohio called. On the night of 30 Mar 65 her daughter, at 2200 was sitting in a chair doing her homework, in a West window. "There was something in the sky I have never seen before". A great big golden light hanging in the sky. Never seen anything like it before. It was a huge golden gold light, a great big gold light, saw a plane go over high at the same time. My youngest daughter watched it for a couple of minutes, it flickered and disappeared.

At 0830, 1 Apr 65, Mrs [REDACTED] called. On the night of 30 Mar 65 at approximately [REDACTED] or [REDACTED] her husband also saw the flying object while driving in Oakwood, they were coming North on Shafer three south of [REDACTED] glanced out of the West, there was a large light in the sky many many feet above the ground. Too large to be stars, they were driving slowly and Mrs [REDACTED] looked and saw them both, we lost sight of it when passing houses, lights were both of gold tone and the upper seemed to be slightly smaller than the one on the horizon. Couldn't tell if there was any motion, we saw them for at least $\frac{1}{2}$ minute. Looked like a tower, it had to be miles away, it looked like 3 or 4 " in diameter, much too bright to be a star, no planet in sky, it seemed brighter than Venus as its brightest. Did not see an a/c but saw two lights, looked like it might have been a tower, comparatively lower and perfectly lined up, could have been connected.

Women See "UFO" At Lewisburg

"I just couldn't believe my eyes" was a Lewisburg housewife's reaction to an apparent UFO (unidentified flying object) that Wright-Patterson Air Force base officials are now investigating.

"It was about 10 p.m. when my mother said 'Look at that strange-looking object in the sky,'" Mrs. Howard Wysong Jr. said yesterday.

The two women watched the circular shape closely for about five minutes Tuesday night, Mrs. Wysong said.

Gold In Color

"It was gold in color and seemed to quiver. It was about five times bigger than a regular star," she recalled.

"It had an antenna on top and the length seemed to be equal to the circumference of the object."

"It was stationary as we watched it, looking toward the west. Then it started moving south and it seemed to fade in color as it moved away."

"Then, in a split second, it disappeared."

"We kept watching it for awhile and then saw it again in the distance, moving east toward Dayton."

Reflection In Water

Mrs. Wysong could not estimate its size or distance.

"The only way to measure it was in comparison to the stars. I would say it wasn't close, but we could see its reflection in the water," she said.

There is a lake behind the Wysong residence on RR. 1, Salem road.

She was sure it wasn't an airplane because "we saw an airplane passing with its red, rotating beacon."

"I studied it to be sure when I told about it later," Mrs. Wysong said.

Confirmed By Neighbor

She also called a neighbor, Mrs. Donald Mart, who lives across the street.

"Mrs. Mart had told me she saw two of them this year, or last year, and when I called her she said it sounded like the same object," Mrs. Wysong said.

The 23-year-old woman said the sighting was a new experience — "I've never seen anything like it before."

Base officials had no other reports of the incident, they said.

The Air Force's office for investigating UFO sightings in the U. S. ironically is located here.

Proceeded to the US Weather Station at Sulphur Grove and interviewed Mr [REDACTED] who provided the wind data for their 1800 launch. This balloon rose to 98,000 Ft and burst. It did not carry a light. Time of burst occurred at approximately 1930. (See Attached Data) The balloon was a rawinsonde (6-8 ft diameter, white, expanding to about 28 ft at altitude of burst.)

Departed from UFO office at FTD for Base Operations to obtain local WX data. At 2200 on 30 March the winds were from 060 deg at 08 knots. Temperature was 30 deg. Local wind data indicated that the winds were such that a balloon from the Dayton area could have been over the Lewisburg area.

Information regarding balloons launched from this site in general revealed that the only launch that carries a light is the midnight (2400 local) launch. The light on this balloon is a white flashlight type of a light. The nearest other US WX Bureau launches are at Flint, Michigan, Pittsburg, Pennsylvania and Rantoul, Illinois. The average bursting altitude of the rawinsonde is 90,000 and the rate of climb between 750-800 ft per minute. The only time that this ascent is slowed is when ice forms on the balloons from the atmosphere. Under icing conditions the balloon may maintain the same altitude, fall or rise more slowly.

From Sulphur Grove we proceeded to Lewisburg, arriving at about 1150. We had lunch and then went to the Police Station. ^{INSERT "A"} From there a call was made to Mr Joe Tucker, Chief of Police of Lewisburg. Regarding the observation of unidentified objects on 30 Mar he revealed that he had been outside all night and did not see anything unusual. He carries Binoculars. He had heard of no other reports from the area. He had not been contacted by anyone regarding this observation. As to ~~M. [redacted]~~, he knows her slightly. He has known her mother for 2-3 years and described her as "windier than hell", and feels that ~~her daughter~~ ^{MOTHER} is just like her. Chief Tucker retired from the Air Force in 1957 and does not regard this type of report seriously. He has had one report of an Unidentified Object while Police Chief and this occurred two or three years ago. He looked at the object with Binoculars and identified it as an F-100 with afterburner.

From Lewisburg we proceeded to the State Police Office at Greenville, Ohio. This office has jurisdiction for Preble county. Patrolman Don ^{Grimes} ~~Grimes~~ checked the State Police logs for the night of 30 March and no unidentified objects or unusual activities were reported. Patrolman WEBER was on duty in Preble County (Lewisburg Area) on that night. Word of the ~~observation~~ observation will be relayed to him when he comes on duty. A negative report will NOT be forwarded, however, if there were any reports of this nature or unusual observations by him or others he will call Major Quintanilla at Wright-Patterson and arrange for an interview if necessary.

From Greenville we proceeded to Lewisburg where an attempt to contact Mrs ~~[redacted]~~ or Mrs ~~[redacted]~~ was made. No answer on either exchange.

From here we proceeded to the ~~[redacted]~~ (scene of the observation). Pictures of the house, lake and direction of observation were made, as well as the direction (reported) of the object from beneath the windows. A tree to the right of the initial observation was also photographed and directions in azimuth were made with a box Pocket Compass Stock #6605-171-5121 (See Atch 2). FTD Form 164s were placed

in Mrs [REDACTED] mailbox with instructions for her and Mrs [REDACTED] to complete the forms and forward them to our office in the envelopes provided.

We then went to the house adjoining the [REDACTED] farm and talked with Mrs Ray [REDACTED]. Mrs [REDACTED] and her daughter were aware of the sighting but had not observed anything unusual on the night of 30 March. Mrs [REDACTED] then directed us to the Mart farmhouse. She stated that Mrs [REDACTED] was probably at the hospital (Good Samaritan) with her husband who had recently been in an auto accident and was supposedly in critical condition.

The [REDACTED] house is located about .2 mile from the [REDACTED] farm across the road (SE). Mrs [REDACTED] revealed that she had been called by Mrs [REDACTED] on the night of 30 March and told that the object was just above her barn. She and her husband and son were unable to observe the object in the direction which they were looking (SW) and did not see the object. She said that she had observed lights on several other occasions, but did not observe this one. None of the objects she had observed were reported to the Air Force.

Upon completion of the interview of Mrs [REDACTED] we returned to W-P AFB arriving at the Project Office at 1545.

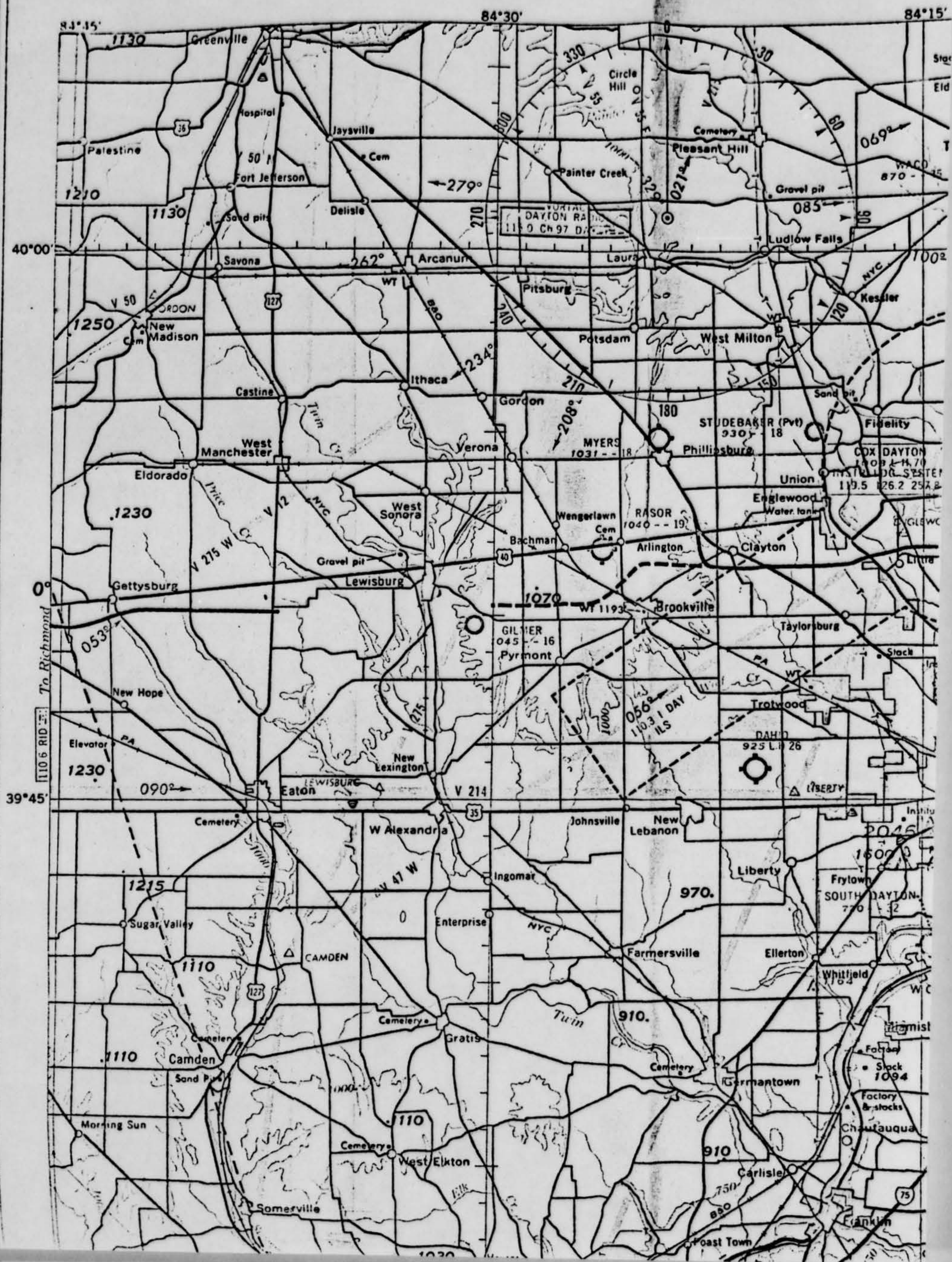

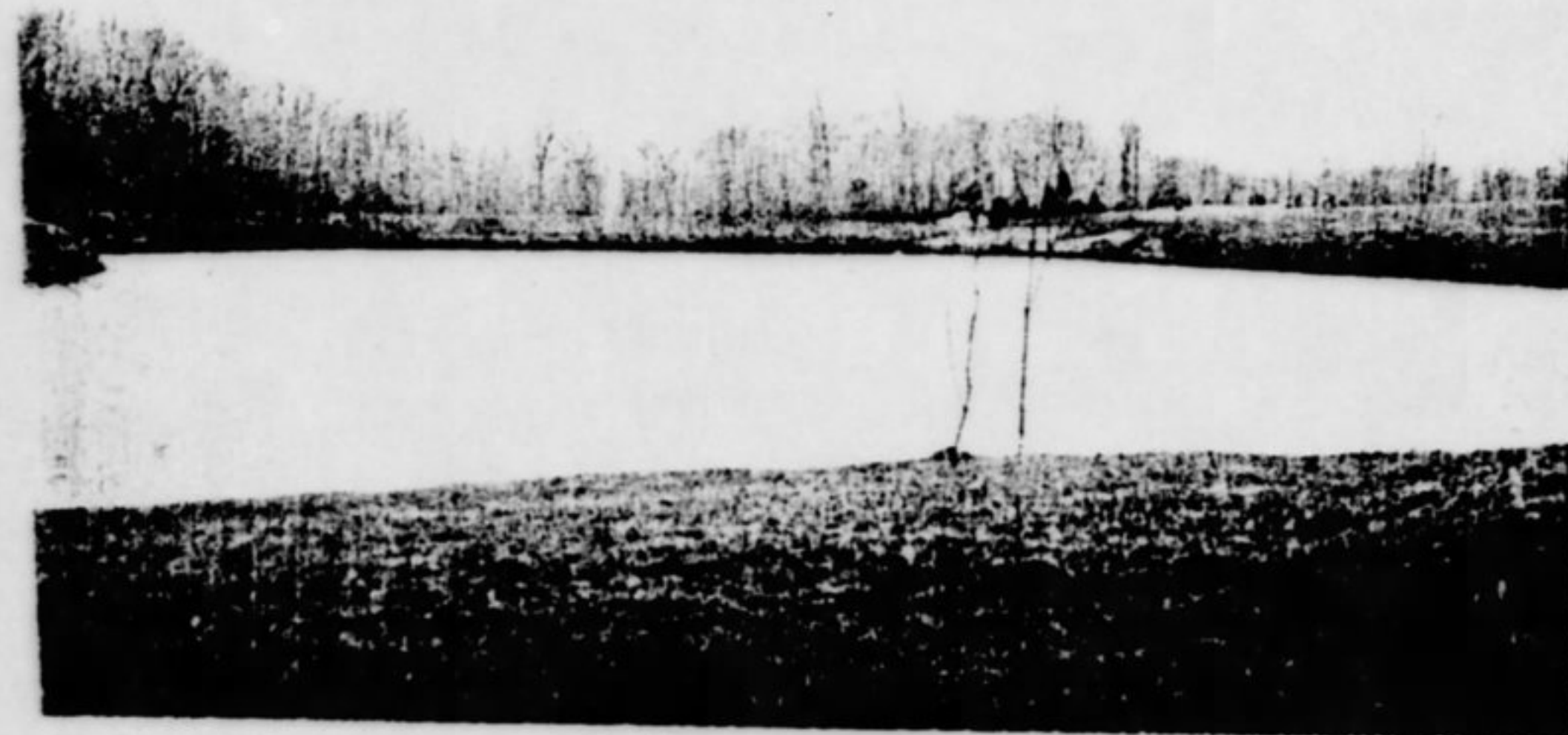
135° MEASUREMENT (AZIMUTH)

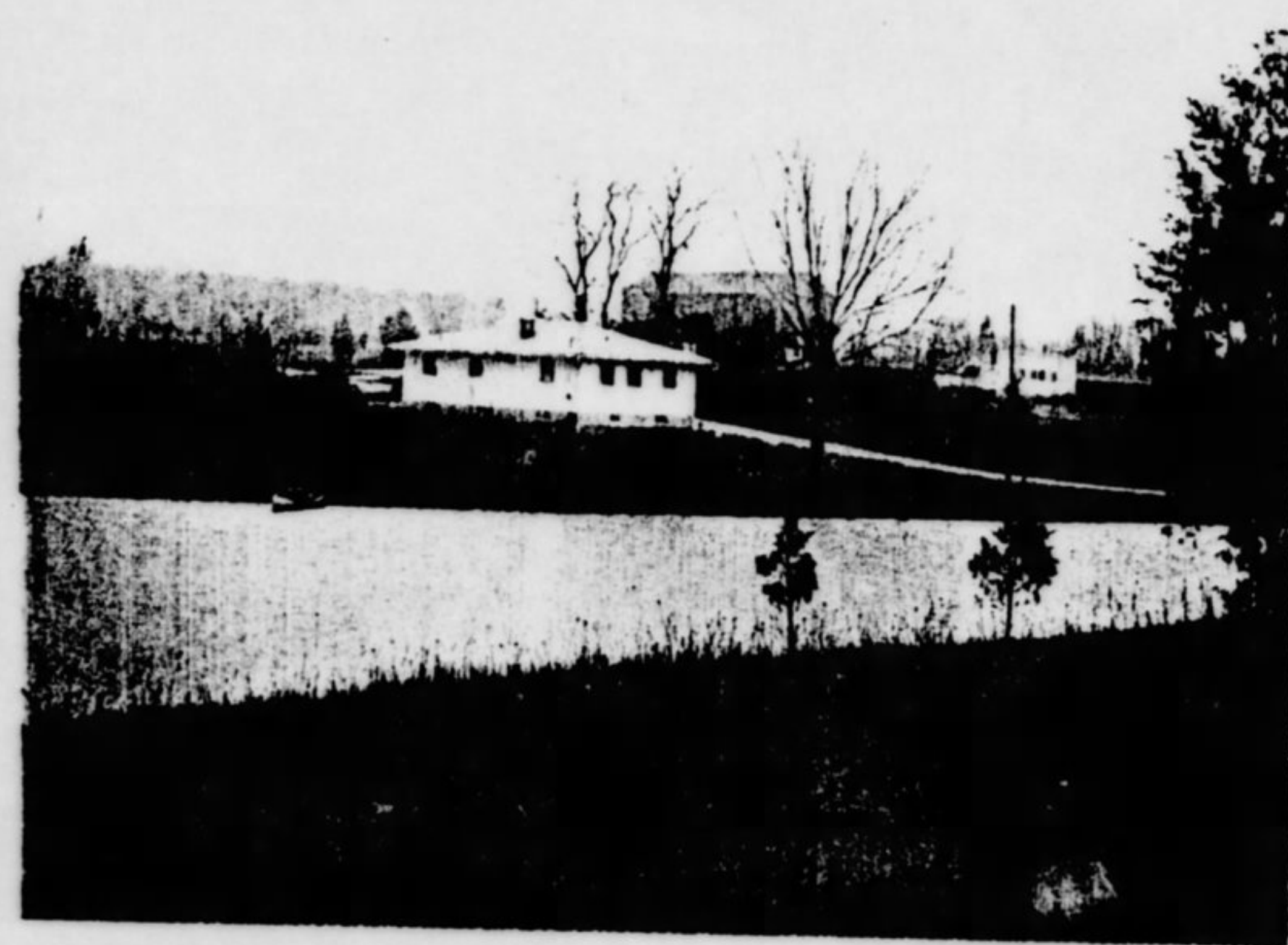
