Dear Major Quintanilla:

In answer to your letter of 19 October 1966 requesting me to look into the sighting of Mr. [REDACTED] made on 23 August 1966, I have the following to report.

I visited Mr. [REDACTED] at his home in Columbus where he lives with Mrs. [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] Avenue. I did not make inquiries as to their relationship!

Both Mr. [REDACTED] and Mrs. [REDACTED] seemed like normal, sensible people whose word could be trusted. Mr. [REDACTED] is a sixth grade teacher in the Columbus public schools and while neither of them have any scientific training to speak of, their story was told in a straightforward, non-sensational manner.

Both of them observed this phenomenon: it was called to Mr. [REDACTED] attention by Mrs. [REDACTED] when they were both out in the backyard at the time of late twilight. The stars were not yet out. I went out in the yard with them and had them go through the full description. Their retelling of the story tallied very well with the original statements made in Form 164 and so there is no point in retelling them here. I checked a few details such as the color of the main object which was white, and that of the ancillary object, was a silver metallic color. The original object occupied about one/tenth of the total field of the binoculars and when it suddenly broke up and five objects fanned out from it to the west, he followed them with the binoculars for a few seconds until they just seemed to vanish. When he turned the binoculars back to the original spot he could no longer find the original object.

This case must remain unidentified unless we take the trouble to ask the Columbus newspapers to publish a short note asking other people in Columbus whether they had seen this sighting on 23 August 1966. I am sure these newspapers would cooperate and I personally think it worth a try. A letter


from your office, I believe, would be more effective than one from Northwestern University which is not in Ohio. I would suggest that Lt. Marley address the letter to the editors of the Columbus Citizen and Columbus Dispatch, asking whether they would run a short story about this sighting. This would enable us to make a triangulation and obtain an approximate height of the object.

The original object seemed to be like a big star but appeared to have a definite disk to it. Mr. [REDACTED] indicated that he even thought that the center was a little darker than the outside. The binoculars were in good focus since he is used to using them and said he kept checking the focus as he observed them. The central object was under observation for better than 10 minutes before it broke up.

It is an odd sighting in that it doesn't fit any general pattern, but I am afraid it must remain unidentified. I don't see how we can quite fit a balloon into the reported maneuver. He stated definitely that it did not appear to be an explosion or a disintegration but rather an expulsion of five objects that moved uniformly out from the central object and at a considerable apparent speed.

I believe this covers the sighting unless you are able to get further reports from other sources.

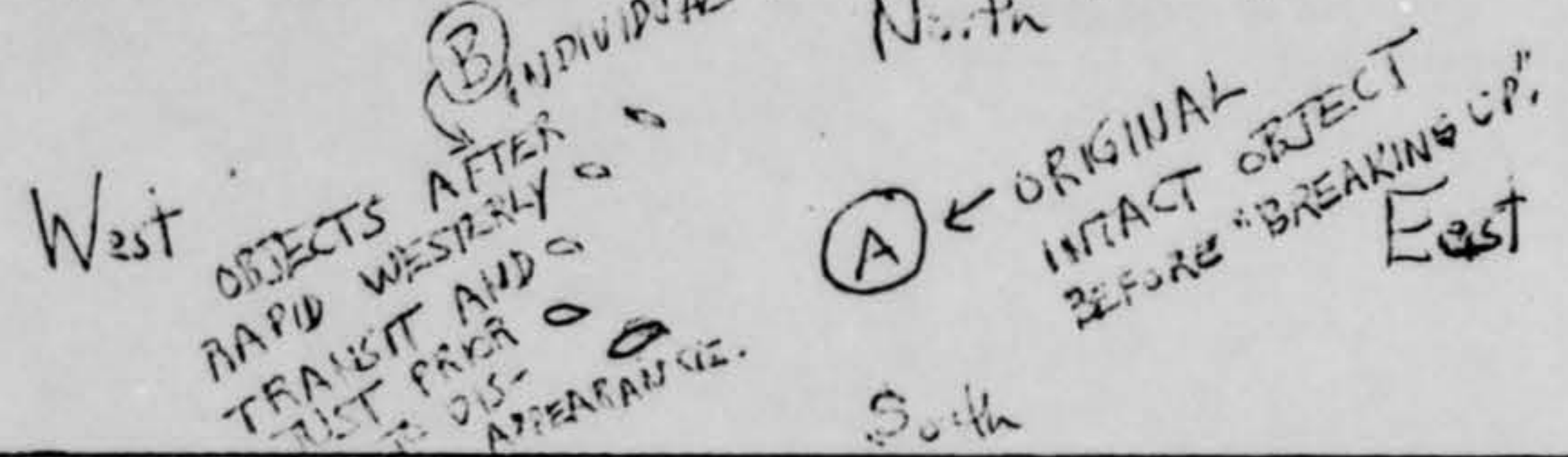

LARGER OBJECT WAS THE ONLY ONE VISIBLE. AFTER I HAD OBSERVED THIS FOR ABOUT 15 MINUTES, WITH BOTH NAKED EYE AND 7X35 BINOCULARS AND I HAD ASCERTAINED THAT IT WAS NOT MOVING RELATIVE TO MY LOCATION (THRU COMPARISON WITH FIXED OBJECTS AROUND ME), I SUDDENLY SAW IT "BREAK UP" INTO ABOUT 5 RAPIDLY MOVING OBJECTS. I OBSERVED THESE MOVING TOWARD THE WEST ("FANNING-OUT" SLIGHTLY) AND THEN AFTER PERHAPS 3 OR 4 SECONDS THEY DISAPPEARED COMPLETELY. THERE WAS NOTHING OF THE OBJECT LEFT. 35. Information which you feel pertinent and which is not adequately covered in the specific points of the questionnaire or a narrative explanation of your sighting.

This was a very unusual phenomenon. We know it was not a meteor "breaking-up" because the object was stationary for at least 15 minutes in an almost-overhead position before the separation of the individual smaller objects from it.

The objects (5 or 6 in number) were elliptical shape. Even with 7 power binoculars they appeared about this size. They, and every trace of the original object completely vanished while I watched.

Whether there had been movement of the original object before I first spied it, I cannot verify (although there must have been some as it moved to that position). But, there was no movement for the 15 minutes I watched it. I was in a reclining lounge chair, the object almost overhead. I could monitor its lack of motion by periodic comparisons of its position with known fixed objects

about me on the ground (and their silhouettes impinging on the sky). No movement occurred until the appearance of the separate objects.

I hope this will prove of some value in your research of these phenomena. I have tried to be as explicit and accurate as possible.

It (the backup) occurred so fast that I can't recall whether there were 5 or 6 objects after the backup. I'm almost positive that there were 5.
