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Jacques Vallee on Christopher 'Kit' Green (I of II) (excerpts from Forbidden Science 4)

Forbidden Science 4: The Spring Hill Chronicles is a book containing the journals of Jacques Vallee from 1990 - 1999. After finishing the book, I decided to go back and pull out some relevant quotes about figures and subjects in the field that people here might find interesting.

For this one, I wanted to focus on Christopher (Kit) Green. After having read through all of Forbidden Science 4, Kit stood out to me as one of the more intriguing characters. It's really hard to gauge how genuine he is, but much of the information and rumor that comes from him speaks to stuff we've all been hearing for years. Rather than go too much into his background, I'd recommend anyone read this blog post and its supporting links. It basically does what I'm doing here with the previous Forbidden Science entries:

Jan. 29, 1990

On the phone yesterday Dr. Christopher (Kit) Green, intelligence expert and former monitor of the psychic experiments at SRI, told me of an interesting incident with General Strudebov, chief of the Soviet General Staff, whom he met at a Texas A&M workshop on disarmament that served as a preliminary forum for the Bush-Gorbachev talks. During a quiet moment at a cocktail party he said, "It's time we turned our attention to a more important danger."

"What danger is that, General?" asked Kit.

"Well, the threat from space, naturally!"

Somewhat taken aback, Kit commented: "I understand that our Star Wars Initiative has caused concern among your people."

"I'm not talking about your Star Wars," interrupted the general with urgency. "I'm talking about the threat posed by extraterrestrials."

"What was that all about, that talk about extraterrestrials?" Kit asked the interpreter the next day. The fellow looked embarrassed.

"Please do not pay any attention, our General drinks too much..." Kit and I agreed this behavior matched the surprisingly intense official interest in the subject I had noted in Moscow.

"It occurred to me that it would be difficult to get together a group of similar calibre if we had to do it in the States..." I told him.

He disagreed: "In the classified world we have people studying the metallurgy of titanium, analyzing the composition of various UFO samples using magnetic resonance; you could find experts studying UFO

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Once in a while it's nice to clarify some little puzzle, even if the big mysteries remain. Over lunch today the enigmatic Colonel Ron Blackburn decided to come clean with me in anticipation of our trip to New Mexico. Ron gave me his impressive biography, with sanitized entries entitled "Achievements in the field of national security." He'd co-founded what I jokingly nicknamed the "Secret Onion" group and co-organized a national panel on UFOs. In the first case, his co-founder was John Alexander; in the second case, it was none other than Kit Green, who never told me about this.

May 5, 1990

John Alexander lives in a beautiful adobe home in a new subdivision north of Santa Fe. In his living room the nine members of the fifth meeting of the "Secret Onion" core group (and the first one where I have been invited) sat around the long table. The first day of the meeting went well, considering the confusing agendas and the fact that some of us were privy to the nature of Ed Dames' experiment going on secretly 40 miles away, while others were not.

Kit did not come for various reasons he enumerated in a letter. He stated that the phenomenon was "robust" and had strong physical effects on people. He added that delusion often struck unsophisticated witnesses but also, occasionally, the "best and brightest." Surprisingly, in a reversal of what he had often told me, he stated the Government was involved "appropriately, legally, and fairly" through a black analytical program.

Hal described his research in a crisp one-page statement of his current physics model. John Alexander spoke of parallels between UFOs and near-death experiences, which also involve a multidimensional reality. Contrary to Kit, he never found a secret government "Box" for UFOs.

Jun. 5, 1990

Next week I'll meet Kit in New York [This meeting was cancelled when Vallee became ill]. He tells me he's reached radical conclusions over the last three months. The government is taking care of the right problem, he now believes: "The evidence is solid." Yet I've often heard him complain about the "flaky data" ...

Jun. 21, 1990

I told him [Richard D'Amato, Counsel for International and National Security of the Senate Appropriations Committee] about Jim Irish, the closest I ever came to find a man who had been part of a large, secret UFO data-gathering operation. I had once taken Kit to meet him, but there was no follow-up.

Jul. 10, 1990

Long phone conversation with Kit, who heralded a major change: The "best" analytical minds are digging into UFO data, he said, mostly aerospace and technical people. "Small mesh, sensors of all kinds. A lot of strange things are not so strange when you expand the bandwidth," he said: "Bright people with good access, not impressed by standard explanations." He used to think that no really secret project could exist without his awareness of them. But he was wrong, he admits. Kit now thinks that UFO material was recovered but he observes "a large body of consistent, unusual data from a small number of squirrely people. It looks like multiple sources of consistent information, when in fact there are only few sources of inconsistent data." What does that all mean?

Jul. 12, 1990

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Kit met me in the bar of the Madison last night. Our long-postponed conversation covered his insight into government projects, current claims by ufologists, and a follow-up on Brazil. Kit still denies there's a genuine UFO phenomenon. Perhaps only those who have experienced it can grasp its implications? He agrees with my case analyses, but he draws conclusions diametrically opposed to mine:

"There might just be a very few real occurrences," he says, "That Brazilian stuff sounds like rumor amplification, sheer mythology."

"What about the unexplained cases? Thousands of them," I insisted.

"Natural effects we haven't encountered yet. And clever hoaxes."

That made no sense, so I prompted him to clarify his letter to the Los Alamos group, stating that the government "had things under control." Before answering he ordered a cup of coffee and some apple pie, adding cheddar cheese on top of it. He said it was an old Wisconsin custom. I needled him, saying it was disgusting.

"I never had ice cream on my pie until I got to Colorado as a student," he countered with a wink.

"That must have been a happy day for you!" I teased him again.

When the waiter departed we turned to the serious stuff. He told me what had changed his mind about the secrecy issue. "As you know, Jacques, for a long time I have claimed that in my position I would have had to know of secret projects on this topic. Even if they didn't tell me the contents of 'the Box,' I would have had to know there was a box. Between Hal and you and me, and the wide network of contacts we represent, we should have heard something. Well, that was pure hubris on our part. I know this because of something that just happened in an unrelated field, a project I've just been invited to join. Not only had I never heard of it, but it involves people I thought I knew well. It also involves five levels of clearances above my own. And I had a clearance above top secret."

We let the conversation die while the waiter served our coffee and Kit's abominable cheese and apple pie, then he went on:

"When I was indoctrinated into that project, (which I should have been invited to join years ago, by the way, because it fell exactly in one of my fields of expertise) the briefing took place at a large facility that the government operates. The first meeting was a psychological orientation, before they would tell me anything else...

"You'd get a badge at the first desk and sign a book, then you would go to a second desk and receive a second badge, and so on five times, and you would not even get through the front door unless you had a top-secret clearance. The fellow who came to fetch me and take me into the briefing room was a man I had once hired. I had no idea he was involved in anything like this; with a budget in the billions. Even the codename is classified within its own level; it doesn't appear anywhere. There's no way for anyone to know of its existence, until someone invites them inside."

Kit admits he's shaken. No wonder he now develops a respect for government secrecy that borders on awe. We discussed the possible location of a super-secret Alintel (23). He dismissed the 1987 report by Howard Blum about a secret group. Blum's book simply alluded to John Alexander's and Ron Blackburn's proposed project I have nicknamed the Secret Onion. It went nowhere.

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"Right! I went to see Vorona. His shoulders dropped when I mentioned UFOs and he lowered his head. He told me, 'They never let me in on it!' very sadly and dejectedly. Vorona is leaving DIA for a job with military vehicles."

"What about Colonel Hennessey? Bill Moore mentions him as the top guy above Doty, the man giving orders to Falcon."

"I spoke to Hennessey; he swore he'd never met Doty or Moore."

"One of these days there will be an 'Alien Intelligence Agency,' as in my novel, and it'll be staffed by moronic technocrats," I joked.

"I thought I'd found it once," he answered. "I had a tip that there was this office in the Pentagon, 5G47, where the UFO project was located. I went there, and they had a perfectly good explanation for what they did, low-level observables. Until one day I was relaxing with a friend who used to be in the Carter administration, so I asked him about 5G47 and he said, 'Well, that's the UFO office!' Just like that. He had old Pentagon phone books but we couldn't find that office listed. We eventually found it in a 1967 phone book. It has been kept out of subsequent editions. I went back and I had three briefings with those guys. They do Stealth and drug interdiction. Their low-level observables are plain old anti-drug aircraft."

"That doesn't mean there's no UFO project," I pointed out.

"Of course not. I have another source, an insider who tells me he's seen hardware and bodies. But it's always the same story. There are claims of evidence on the side we don't have access to," he said drawing a vertical line on a napkin and writing an exclamation point on the left, "but there is no evidence whatsoever on this side." He completed the drawing with a question mark to the right of the line.

Aug. 8, 1990

"Kit believes that 'Colonel Phillips' in Howard Blum's book is actually Dale Graff," I said, reporting on our conversation.

"No, he's a Colonel at Wright-Patterson," answered Hal. "Collins, who is Condor, met him when he worked there as a consultant. Graff did sponsor some of our work on remote viewing."

Sep. 11, 1990

Hal Puthoff, Kit Green, and I spent last evening together in this great hotel near the Pacific. My excuse to convene our meeting was a review of high-tech projects at IRT, a company in which my fund has invested. We compared notes about MJ-12 rumors. Kit assured us there once was a real "Majestic," but it was only concerned with surviving a nuclear strike. Ralph Blum's book *Out There* claims that the CIA's Domestic Collection Division investigates U.S. UFO cases.

"That's all true," said Kit, "except that since 1977 that group has been called National Collection Division. The Agency isn't supposed to have any domestic operations."

"In your letter you said you thought there was a black program..."

"That's right, I'm sure it's handled appropriately. In my days there wasn't more than one case a month in the classified reports. Now there are several per week; sometimes they go up to the President."

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After a full day of technology review our private discussion came back to Brian's book. The leak may point to Pandolfi at CIA: "They'd asked him to investigate the Augsburg business, the six soldiers," Kit said. "It's getting more and more weird. The messages on classified terminals came out of a secure network..."

"Then it can only be one thing, the Agency counter-intelligence guys, messing with their brains," said Hal.

The conversation returned to the topic of secrecy. As an exercise Kit asked us, on a scale of zero to ten, what was the probability of existence of a hidden government project?

He reiterated: "I am sure there is active collection, handled appropriately. I'm not interested in infiltrating my own government."

Question two: "Are UFOs physical objects, like coffee cups?" I answered that the objects that made the ground traces in Trans-en-Provence and Valensole certainly were. They also agreed. On the question of the existence of biological entities Kit gave a high score. Hal and I were much lower. The research needs to go on.

Jan. 30, 1991

"Most of the researchers we know are zealots at heart, and religious nuts," Kit says. "But there are other things going on. Ever heard of Eric Walker, president emeritus of Penn State University? He claims that Aliens have indeed been recovered and taken to Wright-Patterson... You'd be in awe of the man, dean of engineering at Harvard, co-founder of the Academy of Engineering and of Sciences, chairman of the Defense Science Board, former head of the JASONS, science adviser to the President, former chairman of TRW,... it goes on and on. He stated that four live Aliens were retrieved. We studied them, they learned our language. We allowed them to blend into the population..."

"What's Walker's field of research?" I asked, stunned.

"Sound waves, applications of acoustics. He founded the Navy's underwater sound laboratory. He was also a co-founder of the Institute for Defense Analyses, and a member of the H-bomb team. In one of his books he writes that citizens don't necessarily have the right to know what government scientists are working on."

Kit went on: "He still has an office on campus, so I went to see him. I made it clear I had an official portfolio and clearance to talk to him. He asked me two questions: Why I was interested and why I thought the information should be made public. I told him my interest stemmed from concern about misinformation circulating in the media and that I wasn't sure the data should be made public. Those must have been the wrong answers, because he flatly refused to confirm or deny that he had made the comments in question, or written the letters. But I'm sure he wrote them."

"What else did he tell you?"

"Damn little. When I asked what could make him change his mind he said, 'Bring me a letter from the President, instructing me to talk to you about that stuff, and I'll call the President to make sure the letter is from him.' So I said, 'Perhaps those letters that are circulating over your signature are not really from you, perhaps they're forgeries?' He wouldn't discuss it, and would I please leave his office immediately? By the way, he frequently travels to Russia. He was a close friend of the late Armand Hammer."

Apr. 6, 1991

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Kit has now contacted six cabinet-level people, including former CIA director William Colby. All said, "drop it, we don't understand the statements that were made to you about captured hardware and beings, people must have lied to you."

Kit now believes I'm right about the control system, "but it's human." He recently met a four-star general at a desert location who confirmed the existence of a secret UFO project. Later, Pentagon types who didn't know about that contact tried to mislead him, attacking his clearances. He was shaken by it, although he emerged from the ordeal with a letter from the CIA director: "Dr. Green is empowered by this office to inquire into any matters that he chooses to investigate." He speculates he's too independent to be recruited by the Cabal and shown "the hardware," assuming there is such a thing.

May 5, 1991

I've found out that Richard Doty worked for Hennessey until 1985. He was honorably discharged a couple of years later, left Air Force-OSI and took a lowly job in New Mexico, keeping connections and clearances alive. "When I went to see him he was fully briefed on who I was and what my access was," said Kit. "The altercation I had in DC a few months ago was with Hennessey, distorting the record."

"So he's still with the Stealth program?"

"Yes, but the program has gone through several names. It used to be called 'low observables,' then it became deeply classified and Hennessey was made head of physical security for all Air Force black programs. Now it's under Stealth."

"Where does that leave Doty?"

"Doty claims to be in contact with the manager of a program doing reverse engineering of UFOs. He once made a phone call and then took Moore and Shandera to a place where they actually saw a flying saucer land, close to Sandia." I had to chuckle: "Very impressive! But if you wanted me to make a fake saucer land in the desert, I don't think I would have too much trouble doing it," I said. Kit agreed: "Shandera wasn't fooled; he thought it was a pure Hollywood job."

May 24, 1991

Flying back from Washington, where I just met for three hours with Richard D'Amato at the Senate Appropriations Committee. When I told him about Kit's investigations he agreed the three of us should get together before he did anything about Doty.

Jun. 12, 1991

Thunderstorms are moving into the area, delaying flights. Yesterday in Washington the weather was hot and humid when Kit dropped me off at National Airport after four hours of intense conversation with D'Amato. I had introduced them to each other at the Madison, having reserved a quiet, private table in the back of the restaurant.

We ordered coffee, pancakes, toast, and the discussion began.

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"There's a man at your old shop who's negative on the whole thing, namely Ron Pandolfi. Do you know him?" D'Amato asked.

"Sure I know him, I hired him!" answered Kit. "I can tell you why he may be reluctant to buy into the whole thing. He's had problems with the data provided by Dale Graff, at DIA."

"Well, Dale too is negative sometimes," D'Amato observed.

"I know where his hesitations come from. Some years ago a bunch of us were involved in an operational remote viewing situation when we tracked down a Russian aircraft that had crashed in Africa," Kit went on. "Dale Graff ran the project. It worked so well that he was awarded the Director's Intelligence medal. The day he was supposed to receive it, he'd already boarded the plane at Wright-Patterson when Lou Allen, his commanding general, pulled him off suddenly. Someone had told Allen that the psychic slept with the project leader, and had gotten the information the night before."

"Was that true?" asked D'Amato.

"Hell no! Nobody had any idea where that plane had crashed. So you can see why Dale was upset."

"There seems to have been no end of obstacles for that unfortunate project. Everybody has tried to kill it. That's a damn shame."

"I stopped it once myself," Kit said. "When we did physiological monitoring of the subjects during remote viewing, they occasionally got into extreme states, with blood pressure going wild and massive endocrinological changes, even though these subjects were never under medication or drugs. One day I was visiting the project. One of our best subjects ever, Pat Price, was supposed to track me while I drove to a site I would select by a random algorithm. I ended up in a little chapel. I remember bending over baptismal fonts, a hexagonal thing. I drove back to SRI and found Pat in a dangerous state, close to a coronary. We got him stabilized and he said, 'don't ever do that to me again, there are certain places I can't go to.' He'd described the place with precision, but he never realized it was a church. I knew right there that the project was starting to violate every rule about the use of human subjects, and I had them stop the work."

"What happened to this fellow Pat Price?"

"He died a few years later, in a Las Vegas hotel room. His body was taken to a hospital. Within minutes a man showed up with Pat's full medical file. He put it under the nose of the physician. The doctor wrote "Coronary" and closed the file, didn't bother to check. We never found out who that man was!"

"Did you ever ask the psychics to look into the UFO problem?"

"Many times. Pat Price assured us there were bases on earth. He produced a map with four locations; we checked them carefully. They were technical facilities. One of them, in the French Pyrénées, was a government project, but it didn't involve anything out of the ordinary. Pat said he saw women there; it was an assembly plant with female workers. We never got beyond that."

"Well, we're hoping to get the project restarted under Ed May," D'Amato said. "I expect to fund it at \$2 million a year for at least two years. There's only one fellow who opposes it on religious grounds, a man named Speister. But he's got no right to stop it."

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you looked into them:

"I've been told to go see various authorities that will get me initiated. I've visited two previous directors of the CIA, John McCone and William Colby, and Professor Eric Walker. You should read his autobiography, Now it's my turn."

"What did Bill Colby say?"

"He gave me advice. He said, go back to the people who sent you and tell them you're worthy of their confidence. And if they still won't tell you what it's all about, drop it!"

"Why do you think he said that?"

"He thinks I'm being used. He told me, 'Not many people can come and talk to me, face to face. They want me to know they exist'."

"It works like a Brotherhood, then. What are the parameters?"

"Ah, that's an interesting question," said Kit, perking up. "I think they belong to a project but it's a small project, not a big one."

"It's a small project made to look like a big one?"

"Yes. And it's hidden away in a contractor's basement somewhere, not in the government. And all the Brothers, come to think of it, are people in their seventies, older gentlemen."

I silently wondered where they had been between 1939 and 1945.

"What is the initiation process?" I asked. "In the Mafia, you'd have to kill somebody to qualify."

"Apparently you get invited to go into the desert, near Sandia in New Mexico, and there you see your first UFO," Kit answered. I recalled what he had told me about Bill Moore. But that UFO was a cheap special effects gadget from a Hollywood backlot.

"I heard the MD in the Brotherhood passed away recently, I was supposed to succeed him," Kit added. "Somehow it didn't happen."

"You must not have passed the test," said D'Amato. "How do you think the information works?"

"You'd better ask Jacques," said Kit, "he's the expert on that."

We spent the next half hour discussing control systems, and my observation that the information arrow always seemed to be directed inward like a retro-virus, not outward.

In summary: The secret project is illegal, it isn't within a Government agency. It is small, it generates high-level "leaks" designed to infect the research community with false data, and the cover makes it look bigger than it really is: not bad for one meeting.

After our quick lunch D'Amato left in a hurry to get back to the Hill. Kit relaxed, ordered more coffee and told me, "I know where I've heard of him at the Agency. He's got a good reputation but he's typical of all those Senate staffers, who think they know everything. The world just doesn't work that way."

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Kit's phone is disconnected. He told me that someone was harassing him: "I'm not sure who is doing it, or why. They filmed us during my trip to San Francisco, when we walked near Ghirardelli Square."

"Big deal," I told him. "You didn't reveal any secrets to me."

"They just want to show me they always know where I am."

The fellow he'd noticed near us tracked him in L.A. the next day.

Kit has been testing the French hypothesis about crop circles, using different waveforms to hit the nodes of cornstalks.

"At 5-minute exposure Velasco's hypothesis makes sense; there are biological effects. We suffuse the nodes with plastic to document the results, and after a calibrated burst of energy we take out thin sections. The beams are composed of microwaves."

Sep. 13, 1991

When I called Kit today he told me someone had snapped his picture at Boston airport.

Nov. 15, 1991

[...]I met Kit for lunch in Fremont for the first time since our conversation at Aquatic Park. He'd been shaken up by recent events and there was an edge of fear in our conversation. He has come over to my view that we are faced with two distinct, interrelated phenomena: there are true UFOs "as real as coffee cups," but there's also an Undercurrent that exploits the expectation of extraterrestrial visitors. (I wrote as much in *Messengers of Deception*, back in 1979.)

Kit is busy investigating the case of journalist Joseph Daniel Casolaro, a free-lance writer found dead in a motel bathtub. The body was hurriedly embalmed on orders of local cops without the family's permission and against police procedures.

Casolaro connected the case of a software company called Inslaw with the Iran-Contra scandal, BCCI laundering of money for CIA, drug dealers and terrorists, and the "October Surprise" (38).

We also spoke about Brazil. Why were the Brazilian reports kept from the U.S. Government, he wonders? Or were they?

"I should have received them at the time," Kit says. The only explanation is that somebody is watching: "There must be a pre-existing structure that intercepts such cases." Now we are starting to learn something.

Apr. 10, 1992

[...]I spent an hour with Kit at the airport. He was eager to discuss Hal's involvement with Gordon Novel, who says he's been "brought into the government conspiracy," with no proof of it.

Novel reportedly asked Hal to mount a zero-point energy device on a flying craft that came from the Roswell crash. Hal is convinced this is the big break. Novel has given him a description of a material called titanium aluminide, allegedly from the Roswell saucer. (There is indeed such a material, manufactured by Northrop Aviation.)

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Something abruptly changed about five years ago when the fake MJ-12 documents came to light and the Roswell case was revived. The media campaigns hyping the “crashed saucer” business date from 1980, launched by newspapers controlled by Moon and K-CIA.

Thus, there are two new factors: anonymous sources from inside the government that plant well-designed hoaxes, and high-level officials like Eric Walker who refuse to deny such leaks. As an information scientist I have to regard the channel as more important than the message. The whole conundrum stinks of disinformation.

Jun. 9, 1992

Kit reports that he just spent two days in New Mexico with Rick Doty (alias Falcon.) He concludes: “Every person, except two (Doty and you), of the dozens with whom I have walked closely enough to have (a) a professional judgement, or (b) a clinical-medical judgement, are either losing it scientifically, analytically, or mentally.”

He’s decided to “follow in my footsteps and stay away from the mess,” he says. But why this deference to Doty?

Nov. 3, 1992

I found a need to call Kit for technical advice, after which we got on the subject of abductions, notably Hopkins’ Linda Napolitano case in Manhattan. He told me he was getting data from eight people connected with it. “It’s highly polarized,” he said: “Half of them say it happened, but their descriptions point to delusional syndromes known in the literature. The other half are secret service people or police officers. They find the stories inconsistent. It’s a mix of delusion and deception. The abduction as described by Hopkins never happened.”

Nov. 8, 1992

Kit has faxed over 14 pages of data on delusional paraphrenia that he believes accounts for the Linda case and most abductions. I do not follow Hopkins and Jacobs, but I don’t believe things are as simple as Kit assumes. I pointed out to him that the psychiatric material fails to account for the contagious nature of abduction reporting and the fact that even scientists and doctors often undergo a conversion when exposed to these stories.

Kit responded that the professionals who believed the stories all started out with a predisposition: “Your picking up on the contagion aspect is prescient,” he added.

Jan. 22, 1993

Last night I had dinner with Linda Howe [...] One of her observations concerns the crop circles. She said the CIA had descended on the English fields since my conversations with Kit on the subject and hinted Pandolfi may have sent George Winfield along with Rosemary-Ellen Guiley, Robert Irving and Owen Lewis. “They come straight from Langley,” said Linda. “The group also includes Dan T. Smith and a Dr. Schnabel.” I can’t verify any of it.

Feb. 11, 1993

[Physicist Professor David] Pritchard showed me the details of an alleged “implant” he’s been studying, which only reinforced my skepticism. Kit assures me that most implants are simple material, not mysterious technology.

Personally, I always recommend the Alien Contact Trilogy - Dimensions, then Confrontations, then Revelations.

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CONTEXT FROM ORIGINAL DOCUMENT

Note: TRW is mentioned again in the diaries of ufologist Jacques Vallee, who states that former CIA analyst Kit Green told him Eric Walker stated live aliens were retrieved, studied and "allowed to blend into" the human population.
